




Since there was no official flag during the first year of the United States, there were a great number of homespun flag designs. **This flag** is without question the most well known of those. There are many reasons why this flag is confused with the first official U.S. flag . No one knows who actually sewed the first American flag, but the legend is that it was Betsy Ross.




The only President to serve under this flag was <u>George Washington (1789-1797)</u>. This Flag was to last for a period of 18 years. Each star *and* stripe represented a Colony of which there were thirteen, united nearly one year earlier by the Declaration of Independence.





<u>George Washington (1789-1797)</u>, <u>John Adams (1797-1801)</u>, <u>Thomas Jefferson (1801-1809)</u>, <u>James Madison (1809-1817)</u>, and <u>James Monroe (1817-1825)</u>.




As a new state was added to the Union, usually a new star and stripe was added. That became problematic, so it was decided that

There would be 13 stripes(for the thirteen original states), yet a new star would be added each 4^{th} of July following the admission of a new state.



Became official flag on July 4, 1960.

PARTS OF THE FLAG





• Fly: The bottom length of the flag

 Halyard: The rope or cord used to raise the flag

Hoist: The flag's side or width









Side note---The United Nations headquarters is located in Manhattan, NYC. The **United Nations Organization (UNO)** or simply **United Nations (UN)** is an <u>international organization</u> whose stated aims are facilitating cooperation in <u>international law</u>, <u>international security</u>, <u>economic development</u>, <u>social progress</u>, <u>human rights</u>, and the achieving of <u>world peace</u>. The UN was founded in 1945 after <u>World War II</u> to replace the <u>League of Nations</u>, to stop <u>wars</u> between <u>countries</u>, and to provide a platform for dialogue. It contains multiple subsidiary organizations to carry out its missions.

THE FLAG CAN BE DISPLAYED ON ALL DAYS, BUT PARTICULARLY SO ON:

- New Year's Day, January 1
- Inauguration Day, January 20
- Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, third Monday in January
- Lincoln's Birthday, February 12
- Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February
- Easter Sunday (variable)
- Mother's Day, second Sunday in May
- Armed Forces Day, third Saturday in May
- Memorial Day (half-staff until noon*), the last Monday in May
- · Flag Day, June 14

- Independence Day, July 4
- Labor Day, first Monday in September
- Constitution Day, September 17
- Columbus Day, second Monday in October
- Navy Day, October 27
- Veterans Day, November 11
- Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November
- Christmas Day, December 25
- Other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States
- The birthdays of States (date of admission)



Special note

- On Memorial Day display flag at half staff until noon and at full staff from noon to sunset.
- Flag is flown at half staff in mourning for designated, principal government leaders and on presidential or gubernatorial order





Displaying Flag Indoors

Post on speaker's right (observer's left) in place of honor.







You should salute the flag as it passes--this means hand over heart by citizens and formal salute by those in military uniform. The flag show also be saluted when raised or lowered and when the leader of the event salutes.

When the National Anthem is played, citizens should stand and hold their hand over their heart beginning with the first note and holding throughout the song until the very last note. Those not in military uniform should remove their hats. Face and salute the flag unless there is none, in which case you should face and salute in the direction of the music.

Those who are not US citizens should stand at attention in respect, but are not required to salute in any way.

Place right hand over your heart...

when the Flag is being raised or lowered from the flag pole

when the leader of the event salutes







Place right hand over your heart...

when reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."
